Resume

Noun : A document containing workplace information such as work experience and special skills, presented to employers or colleges



database

Noun: a collection of records which can be sorted and used to predict future outcomes



spreadsheet

Noun: a collection of information (often numerical data) that can be manipulated to predict future outcomes



attachment

Noun: a computer file which is sent via email or other electronic means. Attachments are the main method of spreading computer viruses



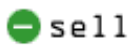
virus

Noun: a malicious software that infects the host computer, often without the users knowledge. Some viruses are very harmful to data



blog

Noun: A **web log** or running commentary on the internet. Postings may be hourly, daily, weekly, etc.



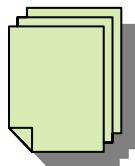
vendor

Noun: A person or company who sells a product or service



entrepreneur

Noun: A person who owns and manages his or her own business



html

Noun: 'hyper-text mark-up language' - the programming language which displays webpages over the internet



rubric

Noun: a set of criteria used to judge or score something

GIS

Geographic Information Systems—software that analyzes data to make predictions



GPS

Global Positioning System—hardware or software that gathers data points for analysis.



elevation

The vertical distance of a point or object above or below a reference surface (generally sea level). Used especially in reference to vertical height on land.



spatial

Related to or existing within space



terrain

An area of land having a particular characteristic, such as sandy terrain or mountainous terrain.



extrapolation

Using known or observed data to infer or calculate values for unobserved times, locations or other variables outside a sampled area; may be a good method for making predictions-not always accurate.



feature

A representation of a real-world object on a map



geocoding

The process of finding the location of a street address on a map. The location is defined with an x,y coordinate value



horizon

The apparent or visible junction of land and sky.



layer

A slice of the geographic reality in a particular area, and is more or less equivalent to a legend item on a paper map. On a GIS road map, for example, roads, national parks, political boundaries and rivers are examples of different layers.

withholding

Pay as you earn taxation—employers withhold taxes from the employee (your) paycheck.



Earned Income

Includes (your) employee wages tips and salaries.; Taxable income.



exempt

Free from withholding of Federal Income tax. Doesn't exempt a person from paying other taxes, like a social security tax.



e-file

IRS online e-file uses automation to replace most of the manual steps used to process paper returns.



steps used to process paper returns.



unearned income

Income other than that gained from work performed—Dividends and Interest on Investment accounts for example.



gross income

Money that must generally be reported on a tax return.



dependent

A person who relies on someone else for support.



financial records

Spending and income records and items to keep for tax purposes including paycheck stubs, statements of interest and dividends earned, and records of gifts, tips and bonuses.



deduction

Amounts that may be subtracted from earned income



Student loan interest deduction

A subtraction from income for interest paid on a student loan to a maximum of \$2500 (2004).

Fixed expenses

Bills that occur regularly (usually monthly) and change little in amount from month to month; (example: car payment)



Flexible expenses

Bills that occur regularly and have changing amounts from month to month; (example: cell phone payment)



Discretionary expenses

Bills that you choose to incur; amounts vary from month to month and occur at no regular interval; (example: clothing)



incur

To bring upon oneself as a result of one's actions; (to incur a bill)



itemize

To place or include on a list—to itemize your expenses on your tax returns



liability

Financial obligations that one is responsible for



budget

A list of estimated expenses over a period of time, and proposals



budget

A list of estimated expenses over a period of time, and proposals for financing those expenses



transaction

An exchange of goods, services or funds



endorse

To place one's signature on a check or contract, to indicate legal transfer of funds or to indicate approval of the contract's terms



stock

(Also known as shares) a type of security that represents ownership in a corporation and represents a claim on that corporation's assets and earnings.
